## **Board Happenings**

Online January Board Meeting January 15, 2018 to February 11, 2018

This meeting was held electronically via email with the meeting agenda and position papers posted on the CW Board Yahoo Group website from January 15 until January 24. Because Yahoo Groups began to demonstrate instability, the remainder of the meeting was held electronically via email with messages and postings on *groups.io*. Below are the key actions from the meeting.

President, Lynn Smetko, called the meeting to order on January 15, 2018.

### Treasurer

The treasurer, Carla Tilghman, presented the fourth quarter financial report and the 2017 Annual Report, which were accepted by the board.

## 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Status Report

The process of putting the book together is taking longer than expected, and the book will probably not be ready for distribution at *Seminars*. The board voted for an initial print run of 2,000 copies, and a retail price of \$39.95.

## CW Journal—Annual Report

Following some start-up glitches, Tiger Press, the new printing company for the *Journal*, is working out well. The *Journal* has some new advertisers. The editor, Ruth MacGregor, welcomes articles by any member of CW and study groups provided the material has not already been published elsewhere. The submission deadlines are as follows:

> February issue—November 30 June issue—March 31 October issue—July 31

### Complexity 2018—Status Report

After the submission deadline, the *Complexity* Committee had received 84 entries from 53 different artists. The number of entries that will be displayed (estimated at between 30 and 35) depends in part on the dimensions of the top-ranked pieces. The on-line tool Submittable worked well.

### CW Seminars 2018—Status Report

Despite a cancellation by one of the teachers, preparations for the *Seminars* infrastructure are going well: meal selection, audiovisual planning, insurance, and publicity. Penny Peters will be the Volunteer Coordinator. The two-day overlap of *Seminars* with *Convergence* causes problems for teachers and students alike. The registration process using RegOnline had problems initially, which Amy Norris worked hard to correct. One day after registration opened, we had 191 confirmed attendees out of a possible 210. Amy Norris announced that Seminars is full as of February 12 and a wait list is available.

### Website Annual Report

Cally Booker, the Web Chair, reports that people are spending a little longer on the website, using the mobile website for mobile devices, viewing a few more pages, and returning a little more often, although the differences are slight. The Board voted for funds to improve the website's *CW Seminars* presentation and archiving of information.

### **Library Annual Report**

The number of borrowers declined to 35 from 49 the previous year. Borrowing transactions are also down: 41 compared to 72 the previous year. About one-third of the loans are for study group materials.

### **Manuscript Recovery Fund Annual Report**

It has been a few years since any new manuscript has come to light. The purpose of the Fund is the preservation of old physical manuscripts. There is a fashion in the museum community for digitizing, but the dependency on formats and hardware that go out of date rapidly makes the digital approach an undesirable conservation strategy.

#### **Area Liaisons**

Alice van Duijnen has created a database allowing Area Liaisons to have a list of names and addresses in each Area. Such a listing has not been possible previously, and the Area Liaisons are pleased.

#### **Date of Annual General Meeting**

The 2018 Annual General Meeting will be held during *CW Seminars* on July 12, 2018 during lunch from 12:30 p.m. to 1:15 p.m. The Agenda for this meeting will be determined during the Quarterly CW Board meeting in April 2018.

### Adjournment

There was a unanimous vote to adjourn the meeting on February 11, 2018.

Success!! When the entry deadline closed, 84 entries from 52 artists were received across all the available categories. The Submittable call-for-entry worked really well with **no** systems issues. Only a few questions came up during the entry timeframe, that were quickly answered. One entrant emailed that Submittable was "so much better" than the system used in 2016. With all the development already done, only minor up-dates will be needed to utilize Submittable again in 2020.

When the 2018 Committee formed, we initially focused on developing an easy to use (for entrants *and* jurors), fullytested, improved entry system and streamlining the overall process of organizing the exhibition. The needs of the *Newsletter* and *Journal* editors were encompassed in terms of image quality requirements and availability of detailed information on accepted work. The entry system, which is such a large part of the work for this exhibit, is in excellent shape.

A document repository was set up in Dropbox so that future teams won't be re-inventing the wheel or spending time searching for information from 2018. This means that a broad spectrum of usable files, some going back to 2012, have been saved and will be available to the 2020 team. ## 40th Anniversary Book

Eight Shafts: Beyond the Beginning Personal Approaches to Design

I must confess: I love drafts and I love learning. Working on *Eight Shafts: Beyond the Beginning* is a chance to pursue an in-depth education. Bringing the drafts for 72 pieces into a single set of conventions, tearing them apart to see how they work, putting the pieces back together, sometimes rearranging for ease of threading, treadling, or understanding, while minutely examining the text and photos is a challenge of the best kind. It is a way to learn more deeply than normal about how the weaver thinks about structure and design. There are often many paths to a single end.

## CW Election 2018

Pondering how different level weavers might use the information leads to the age-old question of how best to present information to a diverse audience in ways that will further their understanding. Additionally, we think about what unique component we, as members of Complex Weavers, can offer the larger weaving community. What aspects are not as commonly covered? How can we provide more emphasis on and insight into the arcane and often under-represented world of handweaving design? If you had a mentor to sit beside you and go through the pieces, what might they tell you about the process or help you to see for yourself? Here, you have 72 mentors (plus the editorial team) to shed light on design and structure decisions!

I have been in love with color and textiles since childhood. Learning to sew as a Girl Scout, I also studied fashion illustration in high school art classes. As a young woman, I occasionally modeled professionally, while pursuing my degree in 'Textiles, Clothing & Art' at the University of Washington. While at the U, I was unable to take any weaving classes, but remained fascinated with the elements of textile design and structure.

I create one-of-a-kind garments and scarves, as well as hand woven items for the home. I joined Complex Weavers after acquiring my first compu-dobby loom in 2006, and learning a few software programs. I went to a CW meet and greet during an ANWG conference where I fell in love with "what you can do" with more than 8 shafts! Thanks for bringing those Study Group sample notebooks.

I live in the Northwest, part-time in Tacoma, Washington, as well as San Juan Island where we have our retirement home, and my weaving studio.

I was a founding member of RAGS, a wearable art show and sale, still going after 25 years, which benefits my local YWCA's programs for domestic violence intervention.

I am active in Tacoma and Seattle Weavers Guilds, and belong to a few other smaller groups. After joining the Tacoma Weavers Guild, I co-chaired the ANWG conference in 1995. I then coordinated the ANWG conference in 2005 when no guild committed to host, and was recruited to chair Complex Weavers *Seminars 2014*. I have been on the CW board since that time, and was appointed in 2016, to the office of First Vice President, filling the vacancy.

## Poster Session at Seminars 2018

Have you created a new weaving technique? Are you about to publish a book? Do you have design ideas you want to share? If you're going to *CW Seminars* in Reno, then take the opportunity to connect with all the other attendees by contributing to the Poster Session.

## Librarian's Corner

When I first joined Complex Weavers, the library's holdings were listed in a small pamphlet which, periodically, was updated. I could never find the pamphlet, and moreover, it was awkward to use because the books were only listed by author; unless I knew exactly what I wanted to borrow (and remembered who the author was) I had to read through the entire list.

Fortunately, the Information Age arrived, a freeware card catalog named LibraryThing was developed, and an enterprising Complex Weavers librarian (I wish I knew who) spent the time to enter the entire collection of books. The beauty of this new system is that library material is cross referenced by title, author, *and* key words. I think it's a great improvement over the printed pamphlet, and although I am far from an expert in using LibraryThing, I recommend you give it a whirl.

The easiest approach is to go to the Complex Weavers web page (<u>https://www.complex-weavers.org/</u>). If you think you may want to request a book from the library, it is probably best if you login at this point. If you just want to browse the library's collection, you don't need to be logged-in. After logging in, return to the home page.

1.Click on the 'Resources" box found about two-thirds of the way down the page. This will open a page with a link to the Library.

2. Clicking on the word "Library" will take you to a page detailing the process for borrowing a book. There is also a link to the Complex Weavers catalog on LibraryThing.

3. When you have arrived at LibraryThing, look at the upper right corner of the page.

The important thing to notice is that there are two search boxes. The upper box with the words "Search site" will search ALL the libraries that have cataloged their books on Library-



Thing. If you want to borrow from OUR library, don't use that search box. Instead, use the smaller search box below. Sometimes the smaller box will say "Search your library" and sometimes it doesn't.

You can type a book title into the box, an author's name, or a tag (keyword). For example, if you had an interest in Russian weaving, you could search on "Russian weaves":



4. Once you have found the materials you want to borrow, return to the Complex Weavers site and type the titles and author into the submission form at the bottom of the library page. Submitting the form will automatically send me an email, and I can begin the process of sending you the books. After the initial submission, feel free to email me directly with your requests.

Please consider borrowing books sometime soon. Library usage was down last year—fewer borrowers and fewer items borrowed. If you have weaving buddies nearby that are also members of Complex Weavers (or wish to become members), perhaps you might borrow books together to use as a basis for an ad hoc study group. Or, if your travels bring you to the Ann Arbor, Michigan, area (I'm nearby), you might visit the library and browse.
