## Greetings Complex Weavers,

Welcome to 2022! A lot has happened since our last newsletter. Two months ago we learned the Anniversary Book was close to being completed. Since that time the book has been proofread and sent to the printers. Our Editor, Laurie Autio, has done the final proofreading, and the book is at the printer. We expected that the book would be completed within the next month. Unfortunately, Tiger Press notified us that they are having issues obtaining paper to print their books. The printing probably will not begin for two or three more months. We will keep you posted.

We are pleased to say that the Sandra Ogg Rude Memorial Grant (SRMG) is now ready to roll out. Each year this grant can fund up to \$1,000 (US dollars) for one of our members. The grant may also be divided among several members if less than the maximum amount is requested. Beginning in mid-February, any member who would like to be considered for a general grant for the coming year, can apply for this grant funding. Your Board is quite excited to see this grant coming to fruition.

Just a short note about applying for the SRMG. Any current member of Complex Weavers is eligible to apply for this grant. In addition, we invite and encourage newer weavers who are not CW members to join and apply for this grant. The application process runs from mid February through April 14, 2022. The grant readers will announce this year's Grant recipient at the end of April. The recipient(s) will also be announced in the May 2022 CW Newsletter. In 2023, any member who is a weaving instructor or educator may applied for the Grant. There will be a different application for the Educator Grant. Look for information about that in mid to late fall. I am looking forward to seeing what all you come up with.

Continuing along with our exciting happenings, the *Complexity* Show is closer to being open. Entries for this juried show were accepted until February 15, 2022. The show will be hung at the Emporium Arts Center in Knoxville, TN, and will open on July 1, 2022. It will run through the month of July. The Opening Night Reception will be July 10, 7 to 9 pm.

We are excited about CW Seminars 2022 happening July 10 through 13 at the Marriott Hotel in downtown Knoxville, TN. Registration for Seminars 2022 began on February 5. Check out our website for more information. Hope to see you there!

We are honored to have been selected to distribute these funds according to her wishes. The Sandra Ogg Rude Memorial Fund will support a series of annual Complex Weavers grants focused on learning and teaching advanced weaving techniques.

The first grant will be offered this spring for CW members wanting to invest in a class, workshop or study to enhance their personal artistic development in advanced weaving techniques. A grant for teaching projects will be offered in 2023. Grants are available for up to \$1,000 (US dollars) per year, and financial need is not a consideration.

#### In Memoriam

Dannetta "Penny" Wakefield died peacefully at home on Aug. 16, 2020 from ovarian cancer. Penny took weaving classes at the University of Alaska Fairbanks (UAF) in 1975 and joined the Fairbanks Weavers' and Spinners' Guild as well as the Fairbanks Arts Association. She and other artisans formed the Fiber Cooperative that operated from 1978 until the early 1990s. She taught weaving at UAF for students and community hobby weavers from 2000 until the present. In 1990, Penny was involved in creating a summer fiber art program for youth which is still in existence. This program through the Fairbanks Weavers' and Spinners' Guild influenced the lives of over 6,000 young people through the teaching of arts and crafts. She has also exhibited her fiber artwork at art venues throughout Alaska and in other parts of the country for the past 30 years. She has been a long time member of Complex Weavers and has an article published in the CW Journal.

#### Study Groups Update

Several of our study groups have plans to welcome in the new year of 2022. Read below to see what is happening. Elaine Plaisance, Study Group Coordinator

**CW Double Weave Study Group** will focus on tied weaves in relation to double weave. Members will be playing with a tied threading to produce double weave as well as a more integrated weave structure. This includes Lampas. The study group decided to reduce the number of submissions from 4 to 2 per year, one being a full project and the other one a draft.

Since the Double Weave Study Group is an electronic-interchange-only study group we have no maximum number of participants and welcome anyone interested in double weave to our group, of all levels of experience. Alice van Duijnen

**The Sixteens Study Group** will soon be choosing their topic for the 2022 exchange. Brenda Gibson

The **Oscar Beriau Study Group** has put out a call for articles from the group. In addition to each member taking a draft, reproducing it exactly and then creating something totally original; they have a challenge where everyone will take the same draft and make something absolutely original from it. That may easily be an article. Members are geeked about it. Stay tuned. Mary Underwood

The 24+/- Study Group will have a new mailing of samples on record sheets from its 27 members (maximum 30) on March 1, 2022. The CWSG 24 +/- is designed as a way to share 24-shaft designs encompassing all levels of weavers with 24 or more shafts. This study group does not require a specific learning study for the year. Our group's freedom of no specific study topic allows us to be in a study group and still do something we alone want to try out on our multi-shaft looms. It is nice to be free to just play and experiment. Members are inspired to try new techniques. There is one exchange of a woven sample and record sheets due February 15th each year. Following on from our investigation of waffles last year, for the 2021-22 year, the **Dimensional Texture Study Group** will be looking at "Floats as agents of 3D". We expect much discussion via email and Zoom as we explore ideas, leading up to an exchange of physical samples in July 2022. Wendy Morris

The **Bateman Study Group** started in 2011. We are now on our third round going through the Monographs, starting again with Park Weaves, Monograph 37. We don't take them in order. We study them from simplest to most complex. We currently have 15 members and would love 5 new members this year. Dues are \$7 (I bought Forever envelopes from the Post Office so for at least one more year, the postage is very reasonable!). One sample set per year is required, in the fall. During the year, members study the chosen monograph. We then exchange, through email, comments and commentary on the weave structure, rules (Bateman is very rule-based), how we push the rules, materials, colors, etc. We use <u>Groups.io</u> to log communications, keep records, photos and wifs. The **Beyond Plain Weave Garments Study Group** currently has 19 members and we welcome more. This group has been together for well over 10 years. Meg Wilson was its moderator before me. The group has a sample exchange twice a year, in which we include a sample of a handwoven fabric that has been used for a garment.

#### Beyond Plain Weave Study Group, cont.

Participation in the exchange is voluntary, and if we have fewer than 8 people participating, we skip that particular sample exchange.

With the exchange sample comes a written description, as appropriate for the garment, which may include: inspiration for the garment, weaving drafts, photos and details of garment construction, any problems along the way, and any other insights. That packet of information is reviewed by a mystery critic, chosen to be someone experienced in garment construction and weaving. People in the exchange receive a packet of everyone's samples along with the critic's comments. All of the information is posted on our <u>Groups.io</u> page, so that all our members may view the samples.

#### Fortieth Anniversary Book:

The CW Board of Directors held a special meeting December 5, 2021, to discuss developments related to the publishing of the Fortieth Anniversary book, *Eight Shafts Beyond the Beginning: Personal Approaches to Design*, which is now at the printer. Publication date is yet to be announced.

#### The January 2022 Board Meeting was held entirely on Zoom on January 22, 2022.

#### Treasurer's Report:

CW Treasurer Linda Kaufman filed the Treasurer's Report, and reported that a 50-percent deposit has been paid to Tiger Press for the Fortieth Anniversary book printing.

#### Seminars 2022:

The Board heard an update to plans for Seminars 2022, which will include Zoom presentations of two seminars as well as the Annual Meeting and part of the Closing Ceremony.

#### Complexity 2022:

The Board heard an update to plans for Complexity 2022. Application deadline is February 15, 2022.

#### Website Report:

CW Web Chair Cally Booker reported there was increased visitation to the website in 2021. Distribution of visitors has shifted, with the proportion of US visitors dropping below 50 percent. Cally will resign her position as of July 2022. The Board is asking for volunteers to step into this position.

#### **Nominations:**

The CW Nominating Committee has submitted the following nominees to be voted on for the 2022-2024 term: President, Karen Donde; and First Vice President, Eileen Driscoll.

#### **Advertising Rates:**

The Board approved a 10-percent increase in advertising rates for the CW Journal and CW Newsletter.

#### "In Memoriam" Column in the CW Newsletter:

Guidelines have been developed for publishing "In Memoriam" news in the CW Newsletter.

### Sandra Rude Memorial Fund for Advanced Learning:

Past President Mimi Anderson has stepped aside her position as SRMF Liaison. Cathy McCarthy, Eileen Driscoll, Sara Nordling, Alison Giachetti and Karen Donde have volunteered to be part of a committee to finalize the application process, which this year will be done entirely on Slideroom.

#### **Digitizing the Study Group Library Collection:**

Ist Vice President Eileen Driscoll reported that the digitizing of Study Group materials is close to being ready to put into action. To date, two groups have agreed to post their materials.

#### **CW** Liaison Vacancies:

2nd Vice President Sara Nordling reported two CW Liaison vacancies have been filled: Stacy Harvey-Brown is the liaison for France and other countries in Europe; and Martha Town is the liaison for Michigan. Liaisons are still needed for Alaska, Florida, Missouri, the Northern Great Plains and the Northern Rockies.

Director-at-large Alison Giachetti has taken on the responsibility for handling the electronic voting process.


