President's Letter

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Why did you join Complex Weavers?

I joined after a friend shared her copy of the *Complex Weavers Journal* with me because she knew I liked experimenting with different weave structures. Flipping through those pages, I said to myself, "I want to rub shoulders with these people so I can learn a little of what they know about weaving, ask them for help when I hit a stumbling block, share my Aha! moments when they happen, and be inspired when I am floundering."

Hello. I am Karen Donde. I am honored to be the new President of Complex Weavers and thank you for your confidence in me. As I get this new hat settled on my head, I have been comparing the expectations I shared above with the mission statement, by-laws, policies, and procedures that govern our corporation and safeguard its finances.

Your volunteer Board of Directors is responsible for those organizational mechanics of guiding this corporation into "perpetuity." You may consider this the boring, business-focused part, but it is critical to Complex Weavers' ability to offer the opportunities I, and I suspect you, were seeking when we joined.

- Sharing innovative ideas with fellow weavers

They took this challenge on in addition to their already significant commitments to CW as president and past president. Thank you Cathy and Mimi and your entire committee.

Second, thank you to the amazing volunteers who worked with me on the *Complexity 2022* committee, the three jurors, and the members who created and entered such exciting and beautiful examples of complex weaving for the in-person and virtual exhibit.

Finally, we all owe a huge debt of gratitude to Laurie Autio, her editorial and production team, and the many talented contributors responsible for our new book, *Eight Shafts*: Beyond the Beginning. After years of meticulous editing, fact checking, graphic design and proofreading, some last-minute supply-chain production delays at the printer and much anticipation, this book was delivered to CW's Merchandise Chair, Amy Norris, just in time for her drive to *Seminars*. Seminars attendees were among the first to lay hands on the book, and they were lined up at the Marketplace table, where Amy was selling them as fast as she could process payments. The same happened when they went on sale in the Yarn Barn of Kansas booth in the Convergence marketplace, where they sold out of the 36 copies they had and ordered more.

Since then, Amy has been selling and shipping copies of the book from her home non-stop, with over 933 shipped by the end of August. The glowing reviews are now pouring in. You will find a few of those sprinkled into this newsletter, on our website and in our social media. They are well deserved. The glossary alone is worthy content for any course of study in complex weaving.

Thank you, Laurie, for your tireless dedication to bringing this wonderful tribute to CW's 40th anniversary, and the memory of longtime CW volunteer Wanda J. Shelp, to the entire weaving world. Complex Weavers is proud to count you among our champions.

Seminars 2022 - Silent Auction


Thank you to all the item donors, auction helpers, and eager bidders at the silent auction at Seminars 2022! We set up "shop" with 45 items including —

New Study Group — Equipment Compendium

Complex Weavers has a new study group — Equipment Compendium. The Equipment Compendium Study Group will gather information about looms (past, present, and future) in order to understand the mechanical aspects of each device, possible uses, reuses, and adaptations, for repair and extension of equipment usage to extend the limits of complex weaving.

Members may join at any time. There are no fees. To join, please contact Francine Jacobson, fjacobson@rcn.com. Here is a more complete description of the new group:

Study group members will develop and utilize templates to support consistency and completeness of compendium entries. The information will be accessible to all members of CW and is intended to include dimensions and features of equipment with ergonomic considerations. The group will also study patents, historical development, and information about how manufacturers adopted, altered, and improved design over time. Sources for replacement parts and newer uses for older equipment will also offer opportunities for study group members to contribute to the compendium and develop manuscripts for publication in the CW Journal. Members will be able to exchange information with each other using Groups.io and virtual meetings. A periodic study group e-newsletter will help members fill in gaps for each other and develop new ideas to pursue. Tools in development, especially those based on interactions within the study group, will remain private to the study group.

The group will look back through the lens of history to understand weaving mechanisms and look forward to the future with adaptations to new materials and methods of manufacturing. Through membership in Groups.io, members will be able to explore cutting edges of technology for fresh takes on equipment across time and around the world.

Board Happenings August Board Meeting August 6 – 17, 2022

New Committee Chair:

Teresa Edmisten has assumed the position of CW Website Chair.

Seminars 2022:

Seminars 2022 Co-chair Mimi Anderson filed an Exit Report for the event. It appears there was a small surplus of funds to cover the cost of Seminars 2022, which had a lower attendance than usual, mainly due to the pandemic or other health-related issues. A few seminars were offered via Zoom to enable presenters unable to travel to the event to share content and interact with registered Seminars attendees in Knoxville, TN.

Complexity 2022:

CW President and Complexity 2022 Chair Karen Donde filed a final report and budget for the exhibit. The Board voted to send a \$200 donation to the Arts and Cultural Alliance in Knoxville, which operates the Emporium Gallery that hosted Complexity, in thanks for their extra services and to cover the cost of hiring someone to pack up the works to return them to their makers after the exhibit closed.

Nominating Committee:

The Board appointed 2022 Nominating Committee members Penny Peters, Bob Keates and Belinda Rosee to serve again on the 2023 Nominating Committee, with Penny repeating as chair.

Sandra Rude Memorial Fund for Advanced Learning:

Past President Cathy McCarthy filed an update for the Sandra Rude Memorial Fund for Advanced Learning. This coming year, SRMF will award a grant focused on weaving instruction, with more information to be published in November 2022.

CW Online Offerings/Digital Communications:

Cathy McCarthy filed a CWOO report. Tien Chiu has stepped down as CWOO Chair, but she will continue to be involved. Teresa Edmisten, who has stepped in as Chair, filed a report on her Web Strategy, which includes a comprehensive vision for moving CW outreach forward.

CW Need for Professional Services:

The Board agreed to engage a legal firm and/or an accountant knowledgeable in and experienced with the requirements of Colorado-based not-for-profits to help CW ensure its operations and future programming remain in compliance with its not-for-profit status, and to provide an external review of CW finances, per the Board's fiduciary responsibilities as outlined in the by-laws.


Want to Practice a Foreign Language and Your Passion for Weaving?
