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Welcome to CW's Busy Season (With Busier on Its Heels)

Although planning for CW Seminars and Complexity 2024 began almost as soon as we walked out the door in Knoxville, almost 14 months ago, things are starting to get very real and exciting. Both events, in Wichita, Kansas, are only about 10 months away, which means details are being added to the Complex Weavers website fast and furiously.

CW Seminars

For newer members unfamiliar with Complex Weavers' signature events, CW Seminars is our biennial, three-day, in-person educational conference. It features 30 different topics presented in a three-hour lecture or demo format. Organized into five separate sessions over three days, the outstanding subject line-ups will require really tough decisions for attendees.

Our keynote speaker will be Rebecca Winter. Rebecca is a self-proclaimed color and texture person, who has spent a lot of time learning about the structure of weaving. She holds not one but two Master Certificates of Excellence from HGA, one in Color-and-Weave Stars and most recently one in Shadow Weave. She is the author of The Enigma of Shadow Weave Illuminated, the second book in history to include information about the method of shadow weave created by Marian Powell. As a registered nurse, Rebecca taught medical assistants at Stevens-Henager College in Ogden, Utah for 6 years, and is now retired. Weaving, teaching drop-in students, paper weaving, and bookmaking are daily occupations. Fabric, yarn, and paper are ever-present in her life. She will present Color, Symmetry, Complexity, Meaning, & Other Peculiarities of a Weaver's Life. More about that to come.

Complexity 2024: Introducing 2024 Juror Muffy Young

Muffy Young is an award-winning professional weaver, selling her scarves and shawls through craft fairs and small galleries. Originally inspired by textiles and landscapes when traveling in South America at age 16, Muffy continues to be influenced by the colors and design elements of Peruvian and Guatemalan cloth. Then, as well as now, the deep well of her inspiration is what is possible on a multi-harness loom with hand-dyed yarn.



While completing her master's degree in math at NYU in 1977, she took a weaving class at a shop near the campus. Muffy had a colorful handwoven blanket from Avoca in Ireland and it sparked an interest in knowing how looms work. She left New York, not to work in math, but to build a career as a weaver.

She learned acid dyeing in 1981 and since then has only worked in animal fibers. Now she works exclusively in silk. Muffy approaches design as a scientist, asking as any good complex weaver does: "What will happen if I try this?" One design leads to the next, and she's always adding new work. Her home and studio are in Waltham, Massachusetts and she is currently learning tapestry weaving.

In Memoriam


Merrie Hewitt

Sandra Ogg Rude Memorial Grant Recipient

Congratulations are in order to David Buskirk, recipient of the CW Sandra Ogg Rude Memorial Grant for 2023. David will be exploring and developing new weave structures that can be incorporated into a photographic collage that will be woven on a TC2 Jacquard loom. These weaves will offer new alternatives to the traditional use of gradated satins and twills.

David will be participating in a two-week residency at the DWL AIR Praxis Fiber Workshop in Cleveland, Ohio. We hope those attending *Complexity* 2024 will be able to see David's end result work. This is something for Complex Weavers members to look forward to seeing.



David will be doing a lot of homework prior to attending the class, experimenting on his

20 shaft dobby loom. The woven samples and technical notes he develops will be brought to the residency, along with a cartoon he has produced. These will be integrated into his design on the TC2 to create the final Jacquard woven piece. In his design, David will be incorporating a photo collage, "...Exploring my growth as a creative from childhood into adulthood."

Congratulations, David! We are looking forward to viewing your final results.

Want to Try Something New?

Maybe fall has gotten you excited about putting something new on your loom but you just don't know what to weave. <u>CW Study Groups</u> can help you. Here is a run down of what study groups have openings right now.

The list of groups with unlimited membership numbers and who accept members at any time include: Beyond Plain Weave Garments, Double Weave, Early Coverlets and Counterpanes, Early Weaving Books and Manuscripts, Equipment Compendium, and Structure.

There are also groups that are accepting members in the fall (September) only. These are Ties Weaves (and there is no limit on the number of members), and Dimensional Textiles (who have a few openings for this next round).

Kumihimo is open year round. Be aware, that special equipment is required for this group. *Continued on page 6*

The Sixteens can be joined at any time. They currently have room for 4 more members. If you join after they have set the number of samples each person is to weave for that year, you can opt out of samples for that year and get in on the next round.

Sample Exchange the Old Fashion Way has openings and you can join any time. However, they set the number of samples in June/July and the samples are submitted in the fall.




