Complexity 2024

We are ready to receive entries for *Complexity* 2024! Entries will be made using Slideroom, the same online system used for *Complexity* 2022. I found it easy to navigate and I hope you do too. The link to apply online is <u>complexweavers.slideroom.com</u>. The program is open now until February 16, 2024.

We want to see what our members are doing. What piques your curiosity? What new areas are you exploring? Have you found an innovative technique? Some members may have work on hand which fit those guidelines. Others may be inspired to design and weave a new work for submission. I don't know about you, but something about a deadline helps me focus when starting the process from inspiration to completion. Whether you are new to "complex" weaving or an established artist, *Complexity* 2024 is open to any member of Complex Weavers.

"Innovations in Weaving" can have a broad interpretation. It can refer to your part in a community of weavers engaged in exploring, learning and sharing knowledge. Maybe it refers to your use of new techniques or products which are now available to hand weavers. Or maybe you have a new idea of your own you are using in your work. However you interpret the theme, let us know how "innovation" influences your work.

The intention of *Complexity* is to "showcase diversity and excellence" and to offer a fresh and unique experience. To this end, *Complexity* has always asked for work which is new and has not been published or exhibited previously. With the growth of social media and virtual exhibits, this now includes restrictions on sharing completed work in its entirety online ("in progress" or images only showing part of the work are okay). The exhibit is less exciting when the work is already familiar to the viewers. And it becomes more difficult to jury the show without prejudice when the work and artist are known to the jurors. However, this creates a barrier which can lead to missing out on submissions from artists we want to see in the show.

Please contact me if you have any questions about the eligibility of your work, or if you have any experiences or suggestions about the eligibility requirements (for future *Complexity* exhibits). Our featured Juror Biography this quarter is about Alice Schlein.

Complexity 2024: Introducing 2024 Juror Alice Schlein

Alice Schlein, a New Jersey native, has been weaving most of her life, having taught herself to weave with the help of Lili Blumenau, a Bauhaus weaver, whose book *The Art and Craft of Handweaving*, was her earliest inspiration.

Alice has enjoyed exploring structures such as lampas and other double weaves on shaft looms, dobby looms, and jacquard-type handlooms. She is the author of books and monographs including Network Drafting: an Introduction and Lampas for Shaft Looms,



and co-author, with Bhakti Ziek, of *The Woven Pixel*. She has taught at schools and weavers' conferences in the U.S., Canada, and the U.K. and more recently to groups worldwide via Zoom.

She currently resides and weaves in South Carolina.



In Memoriam

Sandra S. Hutton

Textiles and handweaving were central themes throughout Sandy's life. She received a B.A. in home economics education with a major in textiles and clothing, an M.S. in clothing, textiles, and related arts, and a Ph.D. in secondary education with specialties in sociology and statistics.

Over the years, she held many positions including Executive Director of ITAA (International Textile and Apparel Association), tenured faculty at the University of Nebraska, faculty affiliate at Colorado State University, Board Member of Handweavers



Guild of America, 1st Vice President of Complex Weavers, Complexity Exhibit Chairperson for Complex Weavers for four years, President of Pikes Peak Weavers Guild (PPWG) and other board and committee positions. Sandy was named an ITAA Fellow, and this organization created an award titled the Sandra Hutton Award for Excellence in Fiber Arts.

Sandy co-authored several papers for Clothing and Textile Research Journal and authored articles for Complex Weavers Journal and Handwoven Magazine. She created and published the Clothing and Textile Arts Index.

Handweavers Guild of America awarded Sandy the Certificate of Excellence-Weaving, Level I, Technical Skills. She went on to become an examiner in the Dyeing and Weaving categories. Always looking for a learning opportunity, she belonged to many study groups including Cross Country Weavers, More Than Four (PPWG), 8 & Beyond (Rocky Mountain Weavers Guild), and Boulder Complex Weavers (Handweavers Guild of Boulder).

Sandy conceptualized then led the committee that created the first biennial Colorado Weavers Day (CWD) conference in 2004, sponsored by PPWG, after seeing something similar in Arizona. Now, twenty years later, hundreds of weavers in Colorado are looking forward to CWD 2024 in Golden, Colorado. Sandy then led the work to create a Fund for Excellence in Fiber arts for PPWG from remaining funds after the first CWD. This fund serves as seed money for new projects.

An ardent supporter of juried exhibits and the level of weaving they bring to weavers and the public, Sandy was instrumental in defining, then chairing the first two international biennial juried exhibits for Complex Weavers that premiered in 2012. Still going strong, Complexity 2024 will be in Wichita, Kansas. She supported and was an invaluable resource for the two international juried exhibits that PPWG sponsored. Sandy's work was exhibited widely and is in many private collections.

Sandy's influence can be seen in PPWG's major project documenting the coverlet collection at the Colorado Springs Pioneers Museum. She worked on data collection forms, bibliography, coverlet analysis, photography, data entry and compilation of weaving records. She also wove a modern interpretation of a coverlet.

Sandy mentored all levels of weavers, especially new weavers. When Sandy presented at a guild show-and-tell, it was a mini-lecture on the technical aspects of her weaving, and she could be critical if she felt her work did not hit the mark.

Author, teacher, juror, leader, and extraordinary weaver with a sharp academic mind, she always enjoyed a scholarly discussion on any weaving topic. She was truly visionary and sought ways to elevate handweaving to the highest level, generously donating her time and financial support to that goal. Her husband, Ray Hutton, fully supported all of Sandy's activities in numerous ways, even going as far as taking several weaving workshops with her. Sandy wove a remarkable life for herself and was a friend and mentor to many. She will be missed.

Seeking Donations for New Complexity Award Honoring Sandra Hutton

Complexity, Complex Weavers' international biennial juried show has just begun accepting entries for 2024 - its seventh exhibition. The concept for the exhibit was developed in 2010 – 2011 by CW Board members Richard Jeryan, Kay Faulkner and Sandra Hutton. The first exhibition, titled *Glamour, Glitter, Glitz,* was mounted in both Washington, DC and Long Beach, CA in conjunction with CW Seminars and HGA's Convergence in 2012. Sandy chaired the first two exhibits and her personal dedication and support are largely responsible for *Complexity's* continuing success.

It was suggested at the latest Board meeting that an award honoring Sandra Hutton be presented to a 2024 *Complexity* exhibitor. Ginger Kaldenbach, CW Awards Coordinator, has volunteered to lead the effort to establish the fund and define its use. Susan Bowman and Lynn Smetko have joined Ginger on the team. The Board envisions that this award will be given in 2024 and in several future exhibits.

Thoughts on Applying for the Sandra Ogg Rude Memorial Grant

David van Buskirk shares his experience and thoughts on applying for the Sandra Ogg Rude Memorial Grant. He is the inaugural recipient of the grant.

I applied last year for the Sandra Ogg Rude Memorial Grant with a great deal of trepidation. I am neither scholarly nor a particularly good writer. I have received a couple of fellowships and scholarships in my life, but only later in life. I was a poor student in school and the story I still tell myself is that I am not good enough to receive such a grant and that I don't have the skills to apply for a grant nd be successful.



I encourage those of you who might consider applying for the grant to say to that unkind voice in your head, "I am busy right now. Why don't you go sit in the back of the auditorium and mutter to yourself. I will join you later to discuss this." and then stand them up. To create a scope of work for the application just do what you do naturally, as a lover of complex weaves: organize yourself.

Once I had the basic goals identified and what I would do to further complex weaving knowledge, the rest of the application was doing what you and I already do so well. That is, we plan a project. You all know how to do this. You've done it many times. For the proposal, just plan the project, write down all the steps and fill in how you will get to the next step. I also thought long and hard about what could contribute to the knowledge base of complex weaving. This is important to do.

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Applying for the Sandra Ogg Rude Memorial Grant, continued

I applied for the grant to help fund a residency at the Praxis Digital Weave Lab to learn to use their TC2 jacquard loom.

My intention is to make a tapestry that explores my growth as an artist, tracing my development as a creative gay little boy (who did not fit in) to a secure, creative gay man living in New York City.

While at the Praxis Digital Weave Lab, I will explore and develop new complex weave structures that can be integrated into a photographic collage that will be woven on a TC2 jacquard loom. These structures will offer new alternatives to the traditional use of gradated satins and twills. I decided to try creating crepe weaves that also offer gradations of warp and filling face. I like the idea of crepe. I hope they will mimic the graininess of the old photos I will use.

One final piece of advice, that I did not do. Give the people you use as references plenty of time to write and send in their references. I waited too long but they delivered astonishing references that I was humbled to receive.

Sandra Ogg Rude Memorial Fund Textile Arts Grant Application

The Sandra Ogg Rude Memorial Fund (SORMF) grant is open for all Complex Weavers who have been a member for at least the last two years. CW members may apply for a total of \$1,000 that will be awarded each year for technical and aesthetic innovation related to learning and sharing advanced weaving techniques.

This wonderful grant was established through the generosity of Sandra and her family to honor her longtime CW membership and to celebrate the joy she took in exploring new ways to push the limits of handweaving.

The grant recipient will be expected to provide a detailed article for the Complex Weavers Journal. In addition, they may choose to also give a slide presentation, teach their topic on a Zoom presentation, develop a poster session, or suggest other means to share their learning with Complex Weavers members.

Please include in your grant proposal:

- A. Personal contact information: First and last name, cell phone, e-mail address, and street address
- B. Does your proposed grant project involve learning advanced weaving technique(s) or teaching the subject to others?
- C. Description of proposed grant activity: Please include proposed starting date, materials needed to work on this project, proposed time schedule and process for completing the project, proposed end date, proposed date for sharing results with CW members, etc.
- D. Explain how your project addresses each of the specified selection criteria:
 - Your continued development as an artist, weaver and/or teacher
 - The specified definition of advanced weaving techniques
 - Your capability to complete the project and fulfill grant requirements
 - Feasibility of the project's proposed budget, supported with true cost estimates
 - Your proposed method for sharing results of the project
 - Potential benefit to CW members

- E. Provide a detailed financial cost analysis for this project. \$1,000 of CW funds are available for the grant(s) offered this year. In the event CW does not award you the total grant of \$1,000.00, would you be willing or able to cover the cost CW may not cover?

Images should be jpegs, saved at 300 ppi resolution with a minimum file size of 1 MB and maximum of 2 MB. Label each with your last name work 1 (2 or 3) completion date of work shown, eg: Smith work 1 2021.
