New CW Award Medallions Are Coming!

With the incomparable Lillian Whipple retiring from weaving the CW Award medallions (which she had done since the mid-1990's), a new volunteer was needed. Ginger Kaldenbach, chair of the CW Awards, worried about finding a replacement. She had asked the Fine Threads Study Group, which Lillian has chaired, for a volunteer but had not received any responses. She turned to me. I told her if no one stepped up I would be the "volunteer of last resort." I guess you know how that turned out, because here I am.

I put together a small design committee – Ginger, Penny Peters and myself – to help make the many decisions for the new medallion. Together we decided to try to recreate the CW weaver's knot logo as much like what appears on the CW Journal cover as possible using the official CW col-

ors: dark teal, moss green and light teal. As in the past, the medallion would continue to be mounted on a white rosette with streamers woven each year by a different CW member.

I have designed and woven a few different weaver's knots over the years and decided to use one of them as a starting point. From past experience, I knew that I could incorporate at least two of the CW colors into the actual knot by using polychrome summer and winter as the weave structure. The committee looked at many permutations and combinations of color placement, considering the three official CW colors plus black and white. It was decided that the knot would be woven in dark teal and moss green, with a white ground cloth. The polychrome summer and winter structure would, in effect, cause the white background to be tinted with the dark teal and green pattern colors, yielding a blended light teal color.

I wanted to use silk both for its shine and strength, and because winners of the CW Award deserve only the best. Susan DuBois of <u>Treenway Silks</u> generously offered to donate and custom dye the yarn for the medallions. We settled on pattern colors darker than the actual official CW colors because they would appear lightened by interaction with the white of the ground cloth yarns. The "white" warp and tabby weft were actually undyed silk.


The next hurdle was to create a knot design no more than 1.75" on the long side; the goal was a 2" square to mount in the center of the rosette. My loom is a 40-shaft AVL, which allows for a lot of design blocks. After the committee considered several designs, one was finally chosen – 32 pattern shafts with eight shafts left over for tie-down ends. The math dictated that 120/2 silk was the largest size yarn that could weave a small enough design and that it needed to be used for the warp, pattern wefts and tabby weft. Should I mention that this would be my first time working with a silk that fine? No pressure there!

Now we come to the weaving, and this paragraph should be titled "Slow Cloth." A 12-inch-wide warp of 1440 ends was put on at a recommended sett of 120 epi, sleyed six ends per dent in a 20-dent reed. The yarn went on the loom well, but the warp was dense and the yarns fine and the sheds did not clear reliably. Before any shuttle could be


thrown, I had to manually check each shed. I had planned on using fly shuttles for the two pattern wefts and hand-throwing the tabby weft shuttle, but due to the shed issues and delicate yarns I ended up hand-throwing all three shuttles. Cue the little violin. It took 1.25 hours to weave each row of four medallions, 312 picks.

A few design tweaks were required after sampling to reduce the knot size a bit further. In the end, I switched from plain weave ground cloth to an eight-shaft breaks and recesses pattern – the threads packed in more, thus shortening the design. Wet-finishing caused all threads to draw together, reducing design size a little more – 1.75 inches on the longest side achieved.

The finished fabric was beautiful and had a fabulous hand. I almost regretted having to send it on its way to Ginger to be sliced and
